



1. Sudan Appoints Kamil Idris as First PM Since 2023 Civil War

Sudan has appointed Kamil Idris as its first Prime Minister since the 2023 civil war, marking a significant step towards political stabilization. Idris, a renowned diplomat and former Director General of the World Intellectual Property Organization (WIPO), brings decades of international experience to the role. His



appointment is seen as a move to restore governance and rebuild public trust in the nation's institutions. The civil war, which caused widespread displacement and economic turmoil, had left the country without a formal political leadership for an extended period. With Idris at the helm, Sudan aims to initiate peace talks, boost economic recovery, and foster international cooperation.

- **Background of Kamil Idris**: Idris is a respected legal expert and diplomat who has served as Sudan's legal adviser at the UN mission and is a member of the UN International Law Commission. His neutral and non-partisan stance is expected to improve acceptance across factions.

- **Significance**: Idris's appointment is seen as a crucial step toward stabilizing Sudan's political landscape, with journalist Osman Mirghani noting that his lack of political affiliations could increase his acceptance among various Sudanese communities, including RSF supporters.

2. Geeta Samota, First CISF Officer to Summit Mount Everest

Geeta Samota, a Sub-Inspector in the Central Industrial Security Force (CISF), made history on May 19, 2025, by becoming the first officer from her force to summit Mount Everest, the world's highest peak at 8,849 meters. Hailing from Chak village in Rajasthan's Sikar district, Samota's journey from a rural upbringing to this monumental achievement is a



testament to her determination and resilience. Initially a hockey player, an injury redirected her path towards mountaineering, leading her to join the CISF in 2011 and pursue specialized training in the field.

- **First Woman from CAPF to Scale**: Mount Satopanth (7,075 meters) in Uttarakhand and Mount Lobuche (6,119 meters) in Nepal in 2019.

3. Justice Kempaiah Somashekar Appointed as Chief Justice of MHC





Justice Kempaiah Somashekar has been appointed as the Chief Justice of the Manipur High Court, effective May 22, 2025. His appointment follows the retirement of Justice D. Krishnakumar on May 21, 2025. Justice Somashekar began his legal career in 1990 and was directly appointed as a District and Sessions Judge in 1998. He served in various capacities, including as Registrar



Judicial and Registrar Vigilance at the Karnataka High Court, before being elevated to the High Court bench as an Additional Judge in 2016 and becoming a Permanent Judge in 2018.

- **Background**: Justice Somashekar is currently a judge of the Karnataka High Court. He will take charge as Chief Justice of the Manipur High Court after the retirement of Justice D. Krishnakumar on May 21, 2025.

4. Mizoram Becomes India's First Fully Literate State

Mizoram achieved a historic milestone by becoming India's first fully literate state, attaining a literacy rate of 98.2%. This accomplishment was realized under the ULLAS (Understanding Lifelong Learning for All in Society) initiative, also known as the New India Literacy Programme (NILP), which aims to promote lifelong



learning and universal literacy. The program identified 3,026 illiterate individuals, with 1,692 enrolling as learners, supported by 292 volunteer teachers, including students and educators. Building on this success, Mizoram now aims to broaden its





educational goals to include digital, financial, and entrepreneurial literacy for holistic development.

- **Achievement**: Mizoram has been declared India's first fully literate state, achieving a remarkable 98.2% literacy rate as per the Periodic Labour Force Survey (PLFS) 2023-24.
- **ULLAS Initiative**: The Understanding of Lifelong Learning for All in Society (ULLAS) initiative, under the New India Literacy Programme (NLIP), played a crucial role in achieving this milestone. The initiative aims to empower adults aged above 15 who missed formal schooling.
- **Volunteer Efforts**: A dedicated team of 292 volunteer teachers, including students, educators, and resource persons, contributed significantly to achieving full literacy. They worked with 3,026 identified illiterate individuals, of whom 1,692 showed interest in learning.
- **Future Goals**: Mizoram aims to expand literacy beyond basic reading and writing, incorporating digital, financial, and entrepreneurial skills to further empower its citizens.

5. First-Ever Khelo India Beach Games Inaugurated In Diu

The inaugural Khelo India Beach Games commenced on May 19, 2025, at Ghoghla Beach in Diu, marking a significant expansion of India's sports initiatives into coastal disciplines. Union Sports Minister Dr. Mansukh Mandaviya inaugurated the event, emphasizing its role in promoting youth development and employment opportunities through



sports . The Games feature over 1,350 athletes from more than 30 states and Union Territories, competing in six medal events: beach soccer, beach volleyball, beach kabaddi, beach sepak takraw, pencak silat, and open water swimming .

- **Participating Athletes**: Over 1,000 athletes from 36 states and union territories are participating in the games, competing in six medal events: beach soccer, beach volleyball, beach kabaddi, beach sepak takraw, pencak silat, and open water swimming.

- **Duration and Venue**: The games are being held at Ghoghla Beach in Diu from May 19 to 24, 2025, and feature teams from across the country, with coastal teams like Goa and Gujarat already making their presence felt in the competitions.

6. India's Adriyan Karmakar Bags Silver Medal At ISSF Junior World Cup

Adriyan Karmakar, a 20-year-old Indian shooter and son of Olympian Joydeep Karmakar, made a remarkable debut at the ISSF Junior World Cup in Suhl, Germany, by clinching a silver medal in the men's 50m rifle prone event. He achieved a score of 626.7, narrowly missing the gold by just 0.3 points to Sweden's Jesper Johansson, who scored 627.0. This



performance not only marked India's first medal at the tournament but also set a new junior national record in the event. His success continues the legacy of his father and underscores the rising prominence of Indian shooters on the global stage.

7. Banu Mushtaq Makes History with International Booker Prize Win

Banu Mushtaq has made history by becoming the first Kannada author and the first Muslim woman from India to win the prestigious International Booker Prize. Her award-winning work, Heart Lamp, is a collection of 12 short stories originally written in Kannada and translated into English by Deepa Bhasthi. The stories, spanning over



three decades, delve into the everyday lives, struggles, and societal constraints faced by women in southern India. This achievement not only represents a personal triumph for Mushtaq, who left her medical studies to pursue her creative passions, but also marks a significant milestone for regional Indian literature.

- Winning Book: Banu Mushtaq won the International Booker Prize 2025 for her collection of short stories called "Heart Lamp", translated by Deepa Bhasthi from Kannada to English. This marks the first time a collection of short stories has won the prize.
- **Historic Achievement**: Mushtaq is the second Indian author to win the International Booker Prize, following Geetanjali Shree who won in 2022 for "Tomb of Sand". Deepa Bhasthi became the first Indian translator to win the prize.
- **Book's Significance**: "Heart Lamp" features 12 stories that chronicle the lives of women in patriarchal communities in southern India, showcasing their resilience, resistance, and sisterhood. The book is a radical translation that preserves the multi-lingual nature of southern India.

8. Tamboli Ayyaj Fakirbhai appointed as Joint Secretary, Cabinet Secretariat

Tamboli Ayyaj Fakirbhai, a 2009-batch Indian Administrative Service (IAS) officer from the Chhattisgarh cadre, has been appointed as Joint Secretary in the Cabinet Secretariat. His appointment, approved by the Appointments Committee of the Cabinet, is for a tenure of five years, effective until March 20, 2029. Prior to this elevation, he served as Director in the Cabinet Secretariat, bringing valuable experience to his new role. He



succeeds M.S. Srikar, who has been reassigned as Joint Secretary in the Prime Minister's Office on a lateral shift basis.

10. Padma Vibhushan Astrophysicist Jayant Narlikar passed away

Renowned astrophysicist and Padma Vibhushan awardee Dr. Jayant Vishnu Narlikar passed away peacefully in his sleep at his Pune residence on May 20, 2025, at the age



of 87. Born in Kolhapur in 1938, Narlikar was celebrated for co-developing the Hoyle–Narlikar theory of gravity, an alternative to Einstein's general relativity, and for advocating the quasi-steady state cosmology, challenging the widely accepted Big Bang theory.

- Contributions: Narlikar was a pioneer in cosmology and science popularization, known for his alternative cosmological theories challenging the Big Bang model. He played a crucial role in establishing key scientific institutions, including the Inter-University Centre for Astronomy and Astrophysics (IUCAA).
- Science Communication: Narlikar was a passionate science communicator who authored books, articles, and created programs for radio and television to make complex scientific concepts accessible to the public. He was also known for his engaging science fiction writing.
- **Institutional Contributions**: Narlikar founded IUCAA in Pune and served as its director until his retirement in 2003. He also led the Theoretical Astrophysics Group at the Tata Institute of Fundamental Research (TIFR) and was a Fellow of all three national science academies of India.
