2.ABRIDGE (verb): संक्षेप करना

Pronunciation: uh.brij

Meaning: shorten (a piece of writing) without losing the sense.

Synonyms: shorten, cut, cut short **Antonyms:** elongate, extend, lengthen

Sentence: The introduction is abridged from the author's afterword to the novel.

3.WRETCH (noun): बदिकस्मत

Pronunciation: rech

Meaning: an unfortunate or unhappy person. **Synonyms:** poor creature, poor soul, unfortunate

Antonyms: innocent, saint

Sentence: Before the poor <u>wretch</u> had time to speak, he was shot.

4.WRANGLE (noun): तकरार

Pronunciation: rang·gl

Meaning: a dispute or argument, typically one that is long and complicated.

Synonyms: argument, dispute, disagreement

Antonyms: consent, agree, assent

Sentence: They were involved in a long legal <u>wrangle</u>.

5.DICEY (adj.): अप्रत्याशित

Pronunciation: dise-ee

Meaning: unpredictable and potentially dangerous.

Synonyms: risky, uncertain, unpredictable **Antonyms:** certain, changeless, constant



Sentence: The company's finances look a bit dicey.

6.APOCRYPHAL (adj.): शंकायुक्त

Pronunciation: uh·paw·kruh·fl

Meaning: (of a story or statement) of doubtful authenticity, although widely circulated as

being true.

Synonyms: fictitious, made-up, untrue

Antonyms: real, factual, literal

Sentence: Most of the stories about him are <u>apocryphal</u>.

7.TOIL (noun): कठिन परिश्रम

Pronunciation: toyl

Meaning: work extremely hard or incessantly.

Synonyms: work hard, labor, drudgery

Antonyms: relax, repose, rest

Sentence: If you want knowledge, you must toil for it.

8.PELF (noun): धन

Pronunciation: pelf

Meaning: money, especially when gained in a dishonest or dishonorable way.

Synonyms: bucks, cash, money

Antonyms: abject poverty, absolute poverty, abysmal misery

Sentence: He was a politician who seems more interested in pelf than in policy

9.CONDUIT (noun): पाइपलाइन

Pronunciation: kawn·dyoo·uht

Meaning: a channel for conveying water or other fluid.

Synonyms: channel, duct, pipe **Antonyms:** closure, denial, refusal

Sentence: This is the major <u>conduit</u> for carrying water to the military base

10.KNAVERY (noun): धूर्तता

Pronunciation: knav-ery

Meaning: a playful or mischievous act intended as a joke

Synonyms: roguery, waggery, frolic **Antonyms:** advantage, benefit, blessing.

Sentence: <u>Knavery</u> may serve for a turn, but honesty is in the long run.

11.VEERED (verb): मुड़ गई





Pronunciation: veeuhd

Meaning: change direction suddenly. **Synonyms:** change direction, sheer, twist

Antonyms: straightened

Sentence: Without warning the car <u>veered</u> to the left and into an oncoming truck.

12.EFFRONTERY (noun): गुस्ताख़ी

Pronunciation: uh·fruhn·tuh·ree

Meaning: insolent or impertinent behavior. **Synonyms:** impudence, impertinence, audacity

Antonyms: civility, courtesy, gentility

Sentence: One juror had the <u>effrontery</u> to challenge the coroner's decision.

13.GROTESQUE (adj.): विचित्र

Pronunciation: groh·tesk

Meaning: comically or repulsively ugly or distorted.

Synonyms: malformed, deformed, strange **Antonyms:** impressive, pretty, ravishing

Sentence: That bloody Halloween mask is grotesque.

14.IMPECCABLE (adj.): निर्दोष

Pronunciation: uhm·peh·kuh·bl

Meaning: (of behavior, performance, or appearance) in accordance with the highest

standards of propriety; faultless.

Synonyms: flawless, faultless, unblemished

Antonyms: amiss, guilty, sinful

Sentence: The head of the investigation must be a person of impeccable probity and

honesty.

15.MAUNDER (verb): गुनगुनाना

Pronunciation: mawn·duh

Meaning: talk in a rambling manner. **Synonyms:** ramble, prattle, prate

Antonyms: go direct, stay

Sentence: The drunk sat there <u>maundering</u> about his troubles.

16.SEVER (verb): अलग करना

Pronunciation: seh·vuh

Meaning: divide by cutting or slicing, especially suddenly and forcibly.





Synonyms: cut off, chop off, lop off

Antonyms: join, link, unite

Sentence: She wanted to <u>sever</u> all her connections with the firm.

17.RUFFIANS (noun): बदमाश

Pronunciation: ruh · fee · uhnz

Meaning: a violent person, especially one involved in crime.

Synonyms: thug, roughneck, scoundrel **Antonyms:** moral, decent, virtuous

Sentence: A gang of <u>ruffians</u> preying upon people who ventured into that section of town.


18.SCATHING (adj.): दुष्ट

Pronunciation: skaydh·uhng

Meaning: witheringly scornful; severely critical. **Synonyms:** devastating, withering, blistering

Antonyms: amusing, droll, gentle

Sentence: Her speech was a scathing indictment of the government's record on crime.



19.DEFT (adj.): निप्ण

Pronunciation: deft

Meaning: accomplished with a trained ability

Synonyms: adroit, artful, dexterous

Antonyms: amateur, unprofessional, unskillful

Sentence: He's very <u>deft</u> at handling awkward situations.

20.PERUSAL (noun): अध्ययन

Sentence: I continued my <u>perusal</u> of the instructions.



21.EGREGIOUS (adj.) - भयंकर

Antonyms: Marvelous, Excellent

Sentence: It was an egregious performance in the GRE exam.

22.PLAUSIBLE (Adj.) - मुमकिन

Pronunciation: plaw·zuh·bl

Meaning: Seeming likely to be true, or able to be believed

Synonyms: Believable, Credible, Probable **Antonyms:** Absurd, Doubtful, Fantastic

Sentence: She could find no <u>plausible</u> explanation for its disappearance.

23.EMBELLISH (verb) - संवारना

Pronunciation: uhm·beh·luhsh

Meaning: Make more attractive by the addition of decorative details

Synonyms: Elaborate, Amplify, Enhance

Antonyms: Mar, Diminish, Uglify

24.WAIVER (Noun) - त्याग

Meaning: A situation in which somebody gives up a legal claim or right

Synonyms: Disclaimer, Release **Antonyms:** Accept, Approval, Claim

Sentence: We had to sign a <u>waiver</u>, giving up any rights to the land in the future.

25.SUBSTANTIVE (adj.) - मूल

Meaning: Having a firm basis in reality and so important, meaningful

Synonyms: Considerable, Biggish, Major, Significant

Antonyms: Minute, Trivial, Marginal

Sentence: Substantive research on the subject needs to be carried out.

26.TANDEM (Adverb) - मिलकर

Pronunciation: tan-dem

Meaning: Alongside each other

Synonyms: Together



Antonyms: Individual, Single

Sentence: The two teams are designed to work in <u>tandem</u>.

27.IMPERATIVE (Adj.) - अनिवार्य

Pronunciation: im·per·a·tive **Meaning:** Not to be avoided

Synonyms: Compulsory, Incumbent, Necessary

Antonyms: Unnecessary, Optional

Sentence: It is <u>imperative</u> that politician should be good communicators.

28.DETERRENCE (Noun) - अवरोध

30.ASTOUND (Verb) - हक्का बक्का

Sentence: He wants to surpass & <u>astound</u> them by transforming the district.

31.SLICK (noun): चालाक

Meaning: done or operating in an impressively smooth and efficient way.

Synonyms: efficient, smooth, smooth-running, polished

Antonyms: amateurish, clumsy, inexpert

Sentence: By the time he becomes a very <u>slick</u> person.

32.POMP (noun) : वैभव

Synonyms: thinness, scragginess, weakness

Antonyms: convalesce, gain, recover

Sentence: These photographs show extremes of obesity and <u>emaciation</u>.

36.STARTLING (adj.) : चौंकाने

Pronunciation: staat·ling

Meaning: very surprising, astonishing, or remarkable.

Synonyms: surprising, astonishing, amazing **Antonyms:** unsurprising, common, usual



Sentence: Her technical accomplishment on the piano is <u>startling</u>.

37.SPEARHEADED (verb) : नेतृत्व करना

Meaning: to serve as leader of an attack or a course of action.

Meaning: having or involving a sensation of spinning around and losing one's balance.

Synonyms: giddy, lightheaded, faint **Antonyms:** clearheaded, stable, steady

Sentence: Jonathan had begun to suffer <u>dizzy</u> spells.

54.PERTURB (verb): घबरा देना

Pronunciation: puh•tuhb

Meaning: make (someone) anxious or unsettled.

Synonyms: worry, upset, unsettle **Antonyms:** calm, compose, quiet

Sentence: They were <u>perturbed</u> by her capricious behavior.

55.SPORADIC (adj.) : छिटपुट

Pronunciation: spuh•ra•duhk

Meaning: occurring at irregular intervals or only in a few places; scattered or isolated.

Synonyms: occasional, infrequent, irregular **Antonyms:** constant, continuous, periodic

Sentence: Her attendance at school was <u>sporadic</u>.

56.ALLAY (verb): कम करना

Meaning: diminish or put at rest (fear, suspicion, or worry).

58.RECONDITE (adj.) : गंभीर

Sentence: The book is full of recondite information.

59.SERENDIPITY (noun) : नसीब

Meaning: the occurrence and development of events by chance in a happy or beneficial

way.

Synonyms: luck, good fortune, chance

Antonyms: mischance, misfortune, unluckiness **Sentence:** Nature has created wonderful serendipity.

60.FEEBLE (adj.) : कमज़ोर

Meaning: lacking physical strength, especially as a result of age or illness.

Synonyms: weak, puny, frail

Antonyms: mighty, powerful, rugged

Sentence: My legs are very <u>feeble</u> after the flu.

61.BENEFACTION (noun): दान

Pronunciation: beh·nuh·fak·shn **Meaning:** a donation or gift.

Synonyms: charity, contribution, donation

Antonyms: malevolence, meanness, selfishness. **Sentence:** She made many charitable benefactions.

62.MODICUM (noun): अल्पांश

Pronunciation: maw·duh·km

Meaning: a small quantity of a particular thing, especially something considered desirable

or valuable.

Synonyms: little bit, small amount, particle

Antonyms: abundance, bunch

Sentence: There's not even a <u>modicum</u> of truth in her statement.



63.SQUALOR (noun) : गंदगी

Meaning: the state of being extremely dirty and unpleasant, especially as a result of

poverty or neglect.

Synonyms: dirtiness, squalidness, filth **Antonyms:** purity, cleanliness, spotlessness

Sentence: I was shocked by the squalor of their surroundings.

64.SENILE (adj.) : बूढ़ा

Pronunciation: see · nile

Meaning: (of a person) having or showing the weaknesses or diseases of old age,

especially a loss of mental faculties. **Synonyms:** aged, doddery, decrepit

Antonyms: adolescent, in the prime of life, young **Sentence:** He is suffering from senile dementia.



65.VERITY (noun) : सचाई

Pronunciation: veh·ruh·tee

Meaning: a true principle or belief, especially one of fundamental importance.

Synonyms: facticity, factuality, truth **Antonyms:** falseness, falsity, fallacy

Sentence: No one can question your <u>verity</u>

66.ABSTEMIOUS (adj.): संयमी

Pronunciation: uhb·stee·mee·uhs

Meaning: not self-indulgent, especially when eating and drinking.

Synonyms: temperate, abstinent, austere

Antonyms: self-indulgent, gluttonous, greedy

Sentence: He is <u>abstemious</u> in life.



67.PERSECUTE (verb) : सताना

Pronunciation: puh·suh·kyoot

Meaning: subject (someone) to hostility and ill-treatment, especially because of their race

or political or religious beliefs.

Synonyms: oppress, abuse, victimize **Antonyms:** comfort, console, assist

Sentence: His followers were <u>persecuted</u> by the authorities.

68.GRATING (adj.): कर्कश

Pronunciation: grayt·uhng

Meaning: sounding harsh and unpleasant. **Synonyms:** croaking, croaky, ear-piercing **Antonyms:** gentle, melodious, harmonious

Sentence: She recognized the grating voice of Dr. Sarnoff.

69.INCOMMUNICADO (adj.): सम्पर्क-वर्जित

Pronunciation: in·kuh·myoo·nuh·kaa·doh

Meaning: not able, wanting, or allowed to communicate with other people.

Synonyms: uncommunicable, unspeakable **Antonyms:** communicable, expressible

Sentence: His secretary says he will be <u>incommunicado</u> for the rest of the day.

70.AEGIS (noun) : संरक्षण

Pronunciation: ee·juhs

Meaning: the protection, backing, or support of a particular person or organization.

Synonyms: patronage, protection, shelter

Antonyms: assault, attack, offense

Sentence: The space programme will continue under the <u>aegis</u> of the armed forces.
