### 1. FLARE (noun, verb) – चमक; फूलना

**Pronunciation**: fleuh

Meaning: a sudden brief burst of bright flame or light; a gradual widening in shape, especially towards

the hem of a garment

**Synonyms**: blaze, flash, dazzle, glare, burst, flicker, glimmer, shimmer, gleam, widening, spread **Antonyms**: blackness, dark, darkness, dimness, dusk, gloom, gloominess, obscurity, shade, shadow **Usage**:

• I saw the sudden flare of a flashlight in the darkness. (noun)

• This skirt has a definite <u>flare</u>. (verb)

## 2. ERSTWHILE (adjective, adverb) – भूतपूर्व, पहला

**Pronunciation**: uhst•wail **Meaning**: former; formerly

**Synonyms:** former, old, past, previous, prior, late, then, ex-, foregoing, quondam, whilom

Antonyms: present, future

Usage:

• He was the <u>erstwhile</u> president of the company.

• She is Mary Anderson, erstwhile the queen of America's stage.

### 3. ANTITHESIS (noun) – विलोम, विरोध

Pronunciation: an•ti•thuh•suhs

**Meaning**: a person or thing that is the direct opposite of someone or something else

Synonyms: converse, reverse, reversal, inverse, obverse, the other extreme, the other side of the coin, the

flip side

Antonyms: identity, sameness, convertibility, coincidence, coalescence

Usage: Slavery is the antithesis of freedom.

### 4. PROXIMITY (noun) – निकटता

Pronunciation: prok•si•muh•tee

**Meaning**: nearness in space, time, or relationship

Synonyms: closeness, nearness, presence, juxtaposition, propinquity, adjacency, accessibility, contiguity,

vicinity, vicinage

**Antonyms**: distance, remoteness

**Usage**: We chose the house for its <u>proximity</u> to the school.

## 5. GRAPPLE (verb) – हाथापाई करना, पकड़ना

**Pronunciation**: gra•pl

**Meaning**: engage in a close fight or struggle without weapons; wrestle

Synonyms: wrestle, struggle, tussle, brawl, fight, scuffle, clash, combat, battle, close, engage

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Antonyms: avoid, dodge

Usage: They managed to grapple him to the ground.

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## 6. EMULATE (verb) – अनुसरण करना, प्रतियोगिता करना

Pronunciation: eh•myoo•leit

**Meaning**: match or surpass (a person or achievement), typically by imitation

Synonyms: imitate, copy, reproduce, mimic, mirror, echo, follow, parallel, come close to, approximate

**Antonyms**: disaffect, shun, forego, abandon, despise, contemn, waive

Usage: You must work hard to emulate your brother's success.

## 7. SEDENTARY (adjective) – गतिहीन

**Pronunciation**: seh•duhn•tree

**Meaning**: tending to spend much time seated; somewhat inactive **Synonyms**: sitting, seated, desk-bound, desk, inactive, still, stationary

Antonyms: active, mobile

**Usage**: John's computer programming job kept him <u>sedentary</u> for most of the day.

## 8. DELINEATE (verb) – वर्णन करना, चित्रित करना

Pronunciation: duh•li•nee•eit

**Meaning**: describe or portray (something) precisely

**Synonyms**: describe, set forth, set out, present, outline, depict, portray, represent, characterize, chart,

define, detail, specify, identify, particularize

**Antonyms**: misrepresent, caricature, exaggerate, misportray

**Usage**: The story does a remarkable job of <u>delineating</u> the emotions of immigrants.

#### 9. CAPRICE (noun) – सनक

**Pronunciation**: kuh•prees

Meaning: a sudden and unaccountable change of mood or behaviour

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Synonyms: whim, whimsy, vagary, fancy, notion, fad, freak, humour, impulse, quirk, eccentricity, foible,

crotchet, urge, fickleness, changeableness, inconstancy, fitfulness, unpredictability

Antonyms: stability, actuality, certainty, fact, reality, truth, verity

**Usage**: Margie's angry outburst was a <u>caprice</u> she wished she could take back.

### 10. EMBARK (verb) – प्रारंभ

Pronunciation: uhm•baak

**Meaning**: begin (a course of action)

Synonyms: begin, start, commence, undertake, set about, enter on, go into, take-up

**Antonyms**: disembark, land

Usage: Lawrence has plans to embark on a new career as a journalist.



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
