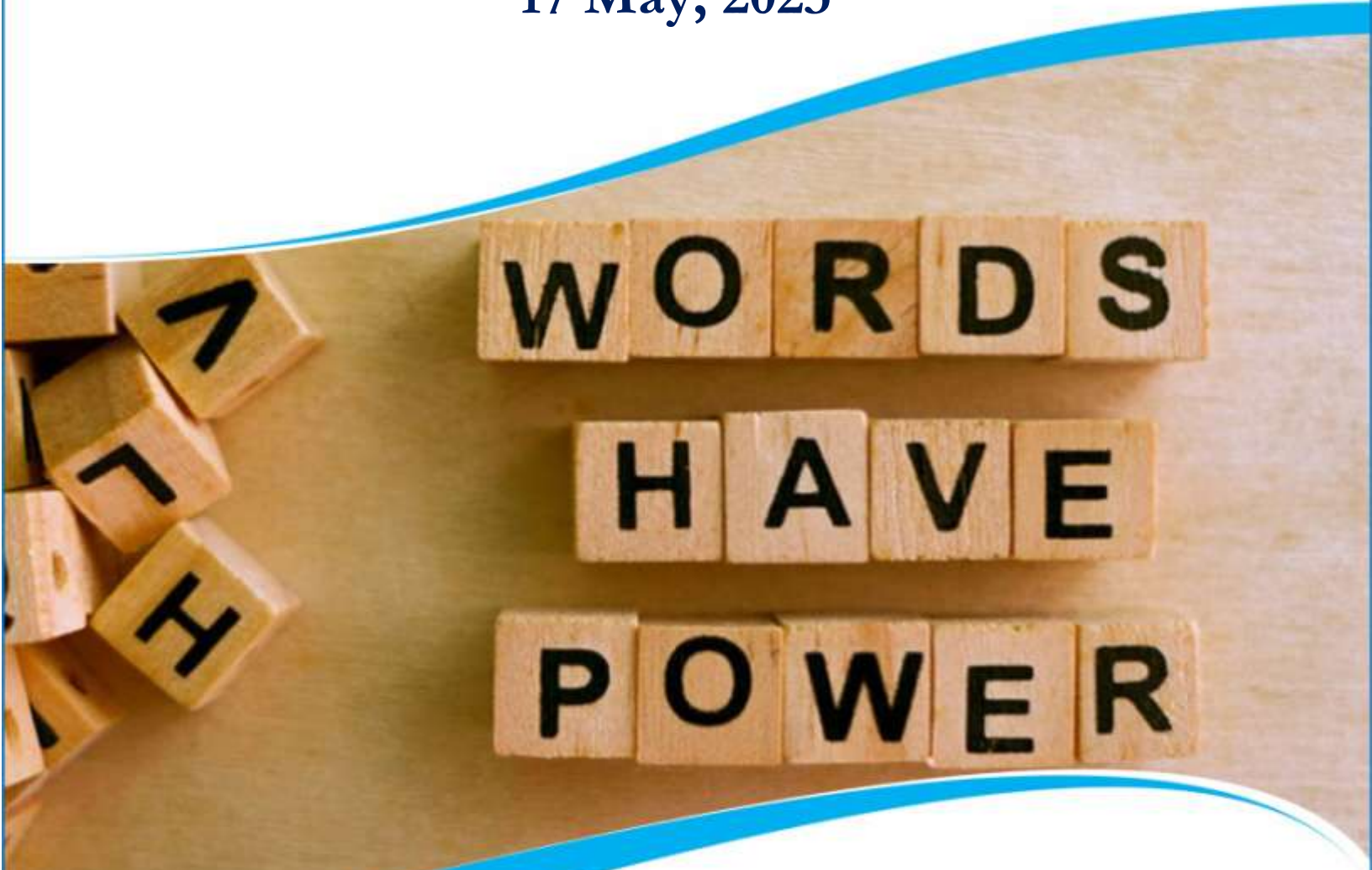

1. PROPHYLACTIC (adj.) : प्रतिबंधक

Pronunciation: praw·fuh·lak·tuhk

Meaning: concerned with or serving to keep something from happening

Synonyms: precautionary, preventative, preventive

Antonyms: aiding, assisting, easing

Sentence: The many prophylactic measures that city officials could have taken to reduce the scope of the disaster.

2. KILLJOY (noun) : मज़ा खराब करने वाला

Pronunciation: kil·joy

Meaning: a person who deliberately spoils the enjoyment of others through resentful or overly sober behavior.

Synonyms: spoilsport, moaner, complainer

Antonyms: jester, reveller, celebrator

Sentence: Don't invite him. He's such a killjoy.

3. EGGING (verb) : अनुरोध करना

Pronunciation: eg·uhng

Meaning: urge or encourage someone to do something, especially something foolish or risky.

Synonyms: urge, goad, incite

Antonyms: discourage, dissuade, hold back

Sentence: Stop egging him on to drink more!

4. LANGUOROUS (adj.) : सुस्त

Pronunciation: lang·guh·ruhs

Meaning: characterized by tiredness or inactivity, especially of a pleasurable kind.

Synonyms: languid, lackadaisical, listless

Antonyms: ambitious, energetic, active

Sentence: Summer has a slow, languorous feel to it here.

5. ACQUISITIVENESS (noun) : अर्जनशीलता

Pronunciation: uh·kvi·zuh·tuhv·nuhs

Meaning: excessive interest in acquiring money or material things.

Synonyms: greediness, covetousness, cupidity

Antonyms: gratification, satisfaction, contentment

Sentence: His villa is filled with evidence of his acquisitiveness.

6. FRITTER (verb) : व्यर्थ नष्ट करना

Pronunciation: fri·tuh

Meaning: waste time, money, or energy on trifling matters.

Synonyms: squander, waste, misuse

Antonyms: conserve, save

Sentence: I wish we hadn't frittered the money away so easily

7. INTREPID (noun) : निडरता

Pronunciation: uhn·treh·puhd

Meaning: strength of mind to carry on in spite of danger

Synonyms: courage, bravery, fearlessness

Antonyms: cowardice, timidity, fearfulness

Sentence: To be an astronaut, you must be an intrepid person who craves adventure and is not afraid of heights.

8. MERCURIAL (adj.) : अस्थिर

Pronunciation: muh·kyoo·ree·uhl

Meaning: (of a person) subject to sudden or unpredictable changes of mood or mind.

Synonyms: volatile, capricious, temperamental

Antonyms: certain, changeless, constant

Sentence: Advertising is a mercurial business.

9. VOLUBLE (adj.) : बातूनी

Pronunciation: vaw·lyoo·bl

Meaning: (of a person) talking fluently, readily, or incessantly.

Synonyms: talkative, verbose, garrulous

Antonyms: silent, speechless, quiet

Sentence: Clarissa was extremely voluble on the subject of good manners.

10. DECREPIT (adj.) : बूढ़ा

Pronunciation: duh·kreh·puht

Meaning: (of a person) elderly and infirm.

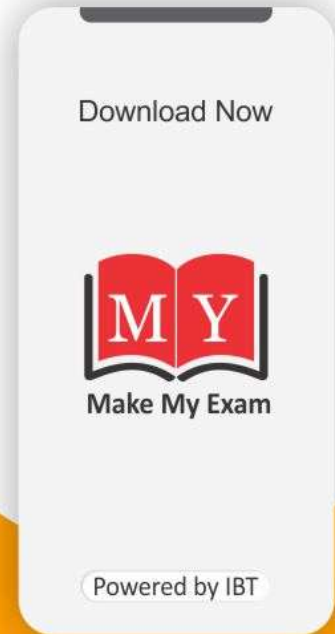
Synonyms: feeble, infirm, weak

Antonyms: strong, fit

Sentence: A decrepit old man sat on a park bench.

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
