

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Exceptional words of English vocabulary from the newspaper 'The Hindu' are listed here. Go through these words and read the usages to learn how to use them in sentences. What's more, take the test given at the last to check how much you learnt. 1. PROPINQUITY (noun) - निकटता, पडोस

Pronunciation: pruh·ping·kwuh·tee

Meaning: the state of being close to someone or something

Synonyms: adjacency, closeness, contiguity, immediacy, nearness, proximity, vicinity

Antonyms: distance, remoteness

Usage: The propinquity of the danger ahead made the scouts turn around and take a different path.

2. POIGNANT (adjective) - मार्मिक, तीखा

Pronunciation: poy·nynt

Meaning: evoking a keen sense of sadness or regret; sharp or pungent in taste or smell

Synonyms: affecting, emotional, impactful, impressive, moving, stirring, touching, bitter, painful, pitiable

Antonyms: unaffecting, unemotional, unimpressive

Usage: I found his speech deeply poignant.

3. IRASCIBLE (adjective) – चिड्चिड़ा

Pronunciation: uh·ra·suh·bl

Meaning: having or showing a tendency to be easily angered

Synonyms: choleric, crabby, cranky, cross, crotchety, fiery, grouchy, grumpy, irritable, peevish, perverse,

pettish, petulant, prickly

Antonyms: affable, cordial, amiable **Usage**: Laziness makes people irascible.

4. CONTROVERT (verb) - अस्वीकार करना, विवाद करना

Pronunciation: kon·truh·vuht

Meaning: to say or show that something is not true

Synonyms: altercate, argue, argufy, bicker, brabble, brawl, dispute, fall out, fight, hassle, jar, quarrel,

quibble, row, scrap, spat, squabble, tiff, wrangle **Antonyms**: accept, agree, assent, concur, consent

Usage: The statement of the last witness controvert the evidence of the first two.

5. REVERIE (noun) – सपना, ख्यालों में खोना

Pronunciation: reh·vuh·ree

Meaning: a state of being pleasantly lost in one's thoughts

Synonyms: daydreaming, trance, woolgathering, hallucination, musing, absorption

Antonyms: realization, reality, nightmare

Usage: He was lost in reverie until he suddenly heard someone behind him.

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6. LURID (adjective) - भयंकर, भड़कीला

Pronunciation: luor · ruhd

Meaning: too brightly coloured; causing horror or revulsion

Synonyms: appalling, atrocious, awful, dreadful, frightful, ghastly, grisly, hideous, horrendous, horrible,

horrid, horrific

Antonyms: agreeable, appealing, attractive, delectable, delicious, delightful, enjoyable, enticing, inviting,

pleasant **Usage**:

- She was wearing a lurid orange and green blouse.
- The paper gave all the lurid details of the murder.

7. ASSIDUOUS (adjective) - परिश्रमी, श्रमशील

Pronunciation: uh·si·joo·uhs

Meaning: showing great care and perseverance

Synonyms: active, bustling, busy, diligent, employed, engaged, hopping, industrious, laborious, occupied,

sedulous, tied-up, working

Antonyms: inert, passive, dead, dull

Usage: The book was the result of ten years' <u>assiduous</u> research.

8. OCCLUDE (verb) - रोकना, बन्द करना

Pronunciation: uh-klood

Meaning: to close up or block off

Synonyms: block, choke, clog, clot, congest, dam, jam, obstruct, stuff, seal, shut

Antonyms: clear, free, open (up), unblock, unclog, unplug, unstop

Usage: It is quite dangerous when blood clots <u>occlude</u> the flow of oxygen in the human body.

9. TERSE (adjective) – संक्षिप्त

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Pronunciation: tuhs

Meaning: brief, or using very few words

Synonyms: aphoristic, apothegmatic, brief, capsule, compact, compendious, concise, epigrammatic,

laconic, monosyllabic, pithy, sententious

Antonyms: circuitous, circumlocutory, diffuse, long-winded, prolix, rambling, verbose, windy, wordy

Usage: Her reply about the matter was terse.

10. PALTRY (adjective) – मामूली, त्च्छ

Pronunciation: pawl-tree

Meaning: (of an amount) very small or meagre

Synonyms: cheap, contemptible, cruddy, deplorable, despicable, dirty, grubby, lame, lousy, mean, nasty,

pitiable, pitiful, ratty, scabby

Antonyms: admirable, commendable, creditable, laudable, meritorious, praiseworthy

Usage: She made some paltry <u>excuse</u> and left.



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
