1.TORTIOUS (adjective) – टेढ़ा-मेढ़ा

Pronunciation: taw choo uhs **Meaning**: full of twists and turns **Synonyms**: twisting, winding, curving, curvy, bending, sinuous, undulating **Antonyms**: straight, unbending **Usage**: We have traveled a <u>tortuous</u> road.

2. BOISTEROUS (adjective) - उधमी

Pronunciation: boy·stuh·ruhs
Meaning: noisy, energetic, and cheerful
Synonyms: lively, active, exuberant, spirited, bouncy, frisky, excited
Antonyms: quiet, restrained
Usage: The children are very boisterous today.

3. MERCURIAL (adjective) - अस्थिर

Pronunciation: muh·kyuor·ree·uhl **Meaning**: subject to sudden or unpredictable changes of mood or mind **Synonyms**: volatile, capricious, excitable, fickle, changeable, unpredictable, variable

Antonyms: stable, steady, constant

Usage: The trending topics on Twitter are <u>mercurial</u> because they often change within seconds.

4. ULTERIOR (adjective) - गुप्त

Pronunciation: uhl·teeuh·ree·uh

Meaning: existing beyond what is obvious or admitted

Synonyms: secondary, underlying, undisclosed, unexpressed, unapparent, unrevealed, secret

Antonyms: visible, noticeable

Usage: The accountant's <u>ulterior</u> motives led her to stealing bank funds under the company radar.



5. IGNOBLE (adjective) – अप्रतिष्ठित

Pronunciation: uhg·now·bl
Meaning: not honorable in character or purpose
Synonyms: dishonorable, unworthy, base, shameful, contemptible, despicable, shabby
Antonyms: noble
Usage: The ignoble accountant was convicted of stealing money from his firm.

6. SALUTARY (adjective) – लाभदायक

Pronunciation: sa·lyoo·tuh·ree
Meaning: producing good effects; beneficial
Synonyms: beneficial, good, advantageous, profitable, productive, helpful, useful
Antonyms: unwelcome, irrelevant
Usage: The lab experiment provided <u>salutary</u> results that will help researchers learn the key

to battling the disease.

7. UPBRAID (verb) - फटकारना

Pronunciation: uhp breid
Meaning: scold
Synonyms: reprimand, rebuke, reproach, scold, chastise, reprove
Antonyms: praise, commend, congratulate
Usage: The police officer did not hesitate to <u>upbraid</u> the man for driving without insurance.

8. CAVALIER (adjective) – बेतकल्लुफ़

Pronunciation: ka·vuh·leeuh
Meaning: showing a lack of proper concern
Synonyms: offhand, indifferent, casual, insouciant, uninterested, unconcerned
Antonyms: thoughtful, considerate, caring
Usage: Bryan will regret his <u>cavalier</u> attitude about studying when he fails to graduate on time.

9. UNDERHAND (adjective) – गुप्त, कपटपूर्ण

Pronunciation: uhn·duh·hand
Meaning: done in a secret or dishonest way
Synonyms: deceitful, dishonest, unethical, unprincipled, illegal, unlawful, fishy
Antonyms: honest, fair, above-board
Usage: He has been involved in some <u>underhand</u> dealings.

10. CRABBED (adjective) – अपठनीय

Pronunciation: krabd



Meaning: very small and difficult to decipher **Synonyms**: cramped, bad, shaky, scribbled, illegible, unreadable, indecipherable **Antonyms**: bold, clear **Usage**: His <u>crabbed</u> handwriting covered both sides of the page.

11. SUBJUGATION (noun) – अधीनता

Pronunciation: suhb·ju·gei·shn
Meaning: to be controlled or forced to do something
Synonyms: slavery, bondage, captivity, enslavement, labor, serfdom, servitude
Antonyms: freedom, independence, mastery
Usage: The greatest achievement of the reign was the <u>subjugation</u> of Bulgaria.

12. FORESTALL (verb) – पहले ही रोक देना

Pronunciation: faw·stawl
Meaning: to stop something from happening
Synonyms: prevent, anticipate, avert, deter, hinder, preclude, thwart
Antonyms: aid, allow, assist
Usage: Fortunately at the last minute, a mediator was able to talk to the two world leaders and <u>forestall</u> war.

13. SLAM (verb) – ज़ोर से पटक देना

Pronunciation: faw·stawl
Meaning: to shut with loud and with forceful power
Synonyms: bang, bat, batter, beat, dash, fling, smash
Antonyms: open, tap
Usage: Mother warned the children not to <u>slam</u> the kitchen door, but they always shut it behind them forcefully.

14. ARBITRARY (adjective) - स्वेच्छित, अनियन्त्रित

Pronunciation: aa·buh·truh·ree
Meaning: chosen or done at random
Synonyms: whimsical, random, capricious, chance, erratic, inconsistent, unreasoned
Antonyms: rational, reasoned, consistent
Usage: Emily made an <u>arbitrary</u> decision to drive across the country.

15. CLUMSY (adjective) - बेढंगा

Pronunciation: kluhm·zee

Meaning: awkward in movement or handling things **Synonyms**: awkward, uncoordinated, ungraceful, inelegant, gawky, cloddish, blundering



Antonyms: graceful, coordinated, elegant

Usage: I would never trust someone who is <u>clumsy</u> as a surgeon since such a career requires finesse and precision.

16. WHIRL (verb) - घुमाव

Pronunciation: wuhl
Meaning: the act of rotating rapidly
Synonyms: spin, revolution, flurry, swirl, circle, circuit, circulation
Antonyms: calm, peace
Usage: The tornado continued to <u>whirl</u> around, kicking up dust along its path.

17. PERILOUS (adjective) - ख़तरनाक

Pronunciation: peh·ruh·luhs

Meaning: full of danger or risk

Synonyms: dangerous, hazardous, risky, unsafe, treacherous, precarious, vulnerable **Antonyms:** safe, secure, protected

Usage: Putting out wildfires is a very perilous job.



18. GERMINATE (verb) – उगना

Pronunciation: juh·muh·neit
Meaning: to grow or develop
Synonyms: grow, sprout, bud, develop, generate, vegetate
Antonyms: cease, compress, halt
Usage: The plants need an adequate amount of water to germinate.

19. SURGE (noun) - लहर, वृद्धि

Pronunciation: suhj **Meaning**: a sudden increase **Synonyms**: rush, grow, rise, stream, arise, growth, tower



Antonyms: decrease, descend, lessen

Usage: Because of low supply and high demand, there is a sudden <u>surge</u> in the price of natural oil.

20. NULLIFY (verb) – रद्द करना

Pronunciation: nuh·luh·fai **Meaning:** make ineffective **Synonyms**: cancel, revoke, abolish, abrogate, annul, invalidate, negate

21. KALEIDOSCOPIC (adjective) – सर्वदा बदलनेवाला

Pronunciation: kuh·lai·duh·sko·puhk
Meaning: having complex patterns of colors
Synonyms: multicolored, psychedelic, variegated, motley, complex, intricate, complicated
Antonyms: monochrome, fixed, constant
Usage: The <u>kaleidoscopic</u> quality of the book is brilliantly realized on stage.

22. RECLUSE (noun) – वैरागी

Pronunciation: ruh·kloos
Meaning: a person who lives a solitary life and tends to avoid other people
Synonyms: hermit, ascetic, monk, nun, introvert, eremite
Antonyms: extrovert
Usage: He was a natural recluse who found all human relationships difficult.

23. SLAPDASH (adjective) – उतावला

Pronunciation: slap.dash
Meaning: done too hurriedly and carelessly
Synonyms: careless, slipshod, hurried, lackadaisical, hasty, disorganized, haphazard
Antonyms: careful, meticulous, painstaking
Usage: The student's <u>slapdash</u> presentation looked like it had been put together on the school bus.

24. HYPOCRISY (noun) – पाखंड

Pronunciation: huh·po·kruh·see

Meaning: the practice of claiming to have higher standards or more noble beliefs than is the case

Synonyms: sanctimony, pietism, falsity, humbug, pretense, posturing, insincerity **Antonyms**: honesty, sincerity

Usage: When you agree to serve a cause and then back out, I would call that <u>hypocrisy</u>.

25. TUMULT (noun) - कोलाहल



Pronunciation: choo·muhlt

Meaning: a loud, confused noise, especially one caused by a large mass of people Synonyms: din, racket, uproar, commotion, ruckus, rumpus, hubbub Antonyms: silence, quiet, stillness Usage: The <u>tumult</u> in the streets awakened everyone in the house.

26. ASPERITY (noun) – तीक्ष्णता

Pronunciation: a·speh·ruh·tee **Meaning**: the harshness of tone or manner **Synonyms**: harshness, sharpness, roughness, severity, acerbity, astringency, bitterness

Antonyms: mildness, gentleness, tenderness

Usage: Because the teacher was mad, she addressed the students with <u>asperity</u> as she gave them detention slips.

27. TRUCE (noun) - युद्धविराम

Pronunciation: troos

Meaning: a time period in which opposing sides agree to stop fighting

Synonyms: ceasefire, armistice, peace, break, respite, lull, a moratorium

Antonyms: fighting, hostilities

Usage: When the <u>truce</u> ends at noon tomorrow, it will only be a matter of time before gunfire is heard again.

28. ENTHRALL (verb) - मंत्रमुग्ध करना

Pronunciation: uhn thrawl
Meaning: capture the fascinated attention of
Synonyms: captivate, charm, enchant, bewitch, fascinate, beguile, entrance
Antonyms: bore, repel, dull
Usage: This book will <u>enthrall</u> readers of all ages.

29. INSCRUTABLE (adjective) – गूढ़

Pronunciation: uhn·skroo·tuh·bl
Meaning: impossible to understand or interpret
Synonyms: enigmatic, mysterious, unreadable, impenetrable, cryptic, unexpressive
Antonyms: expressive, transparent
Usage: The riddle remains inscrutable to us.

30. EXTIRPATE (noun) – उखाड़ना, विनाश करना

Pronunciation: ek·stuh·peit



Meaning: eradicate or destroy completely Synonyms: destroy, eradicate, eliminate, suppress, crush, abolish Antonyms: found, support Usage: The new police chief promises to <u>extirpate</u> corruption from the county.

31.OUTRAGEOUS (adjective) – अपमानजनक

Pronunciation: awt·rei·juhs
Meaning: shockingly bad or excessive
Synonyms: shocking, disgraceful, scandalous, atrocious, appalling, unreasonable, intolerable
Antonyms: acceptable, mild, moderate
Usage: Her <u>outrageous</u> behavior at the party offended everyone.

32. ETHICAL (adjective) - नैतिक

Pronunciation: eh·thuh·kl
Meaning: morally correct or acceptable
Synonyms: moral, righteous, virtuous, principled, honest, proper, noble
Antonyms: immoral, unethical, unrighteous
Usage: He was known for being <u>ethical</u> in all of his dealings, which made him easy to trust.

33. VOID (adjective) - खाली, रिक्त

Pronunciation: voydMeaning: completely emptySynonyms: empty, emptied, vacant, blank, unfilled, unoccupiedAntonyms: full, filled, validUsage: The void spaces between the atoms count for nothing.

34. STREW (verb) - बिखेरना

Pronunciation: stroo **Meaning**: to spread or scatter things all over the place **Synonyms**: scatter, spread, disperse, distribute, sprinkle **Antonyms**: gather, collect, compile **Usage**: Do not <u>strew</u> books over the table.

35. KINDRED (adjective) - संबंधित

Pronunciation: kin·druhd **Meaning**: similar in kind **Synonyms**: related, allied, connected, comparable, similar, alike, matching



Antonyms: unrelated, dissimilar, irrelevant Usage: English and Dutch are <u>kindred</u> languages.

36. VAIN (adjective) - व्यर्थ

Pronunciation: vein
Meaning: producing no result
Synonyms: futile, useless, pointless, worthless, ineffective, ineffectual, fruitless
Antonyms: successful, productive, useful
Usage: The toddler's attempt to reach the cookie jar on the counter was in vain.

37. COMMUNAL (adjective) - साम्दायिक

Pronunciation: kuh·myoo·nuhl
Meaning: shared by all members of a community
Synonyms: collective, shared, common, communistic, cooperative, mutual, joint
Antonyms: individual, personal, private
Usage: The <u>communal</u> pool at the community center is open to everyone that lives in the neighborhood.

38. MEDLEY (noun) - मिश्रण

Pronunciation: med·lee

Meaning: a mixture of things

Synonyms: assortment, miscellany, mixture, blend, variety, collection, combination **Antonyms**: loneness, singularity, division

Usage: A <u>medley</u> of various types of art was displayed on the gallery walls.



39. PEACEABLE (adjective) - शांतिप्रिय

Pronunciation: pee·suh·bl



Meaning: inclined to avoid conflict or dissent Synonyms: peaceful, friendly, serene, amiable, calm, complacent, nonviolent Antonyms: aggressive, belligerent, unfriendly Usage: He has lived a <u>peaceable</u> and honest life.

40. EXECRABLE (adjective) – घटिया

Pronunciation: ek·suh·kruh·bl
Meaning: extremely bad or unpleasant
Synonyms: awful, dreadful, terrible, frightful, disgusting, disgraceful
Antonyms: good, admirable, pleasant
Usage: I think that smoking is an <u>execrable</u> vice that annoys people around you and makes you smell bad.

41. EXTRICATE (verb) – मुक्त करना

Pronunciation: ek·struh·keit
Meaning: to free or remove something or someone
Synonyms: extract, free, release, disentangle, remove, withdraw, loosen
Antonyms: entangle, involve, confine
Usage: The soldiers used a detailed plan to <u>extricate</u> their commanding officer from the terrorists.

42. HALCYON (adjective) - शान्तिपूर्ण, खुशगवार

Pronunciation: hal·see·uhn
Meaning: calm and undisturbed
Synonyms: serene, calm, pleasant, balmy, tranquil, peaceful, temperate
Antonyms: stormy, troubled, agitated
Usage: I was very <u>content</u> during the halcyon days of my childhood.

43. DETEST (verb) - नफ़रत करना

Pronunciation: duh·test
Meaning: dislike intensely
Synonyms: abhor, hate, dislike, loathe, despise, abominate, execrate
Antonyms: love, admire, like
Usage: I detest any kind of cruelty.

44. PROMINENCE (noun) – प्रसिद्धि

Pronunciation: pro·muh·nuhns
Meaning: the state of being famous or important
Synonyms: fame, celebrity, eminence, importance, distinction, influence, prestige



Antonyms: insignificance, obscurity, inferiority

Usage: J.K. Rowling achieved national <u>prominence</u> when her Harry Potter series became a household name.

45. ORIENT (verb) - दिशानिर्दिष्ट करना

Pronunciation: aw·ree·uhnt
Meaning: to push in the direction of a goal
Synonyms: align, direct, place, position, dispose of, situate, set
Antonyms: disarrange, miss, disorient
Usage: The merger will not be successful if the two firms can't <u>orient</u> to the goals of one company.

46. BRISK (adjective) – तेज़

Pronunciation: brisk
Meaning: very active and quick
Synonyms: quick, rapid, fast, swift, speedy, energetic, lively
Antonyms: sluggish, slow, quiet
Usage: A <u>brisk</u> jog helped to clear my mind.

47. PROSPECT (noun) – अपेक्षा, संभावना

Pronunciation: pruh·spekt
Meaning: the possibility or likelihood of some future event
Synonyms: likelihood, hope, expectation, anticipation, chances, odds, probability
Antonyms: hopelessness, impossibility, unlikelihood
Usage: There was no prospect of any reconciliation.

48. SURMOUNT (verb) – विजय पाना

Pronunciation: suh mawnt
Meaning: to conquer a problem or obstacle
Synonyms: overcome, conquer, overpower, subdue, surpass, vanquish
Antonyms: lose, fail, surrender
Usage: One of Janet's goals is to <u>surmount</u> her fear of flying.

49. PURSUIT (noun) - तलाश

Pronunciation: puh·syoot **Meaning**: the action of going after something or someone **Synonyms:** chase, search, hunt, inquiry, quest **Antonyms**: retreat **Usage:** The police officer is in <u>pursuit</u> of the escaped prisoner.



50. PHANTASM (noun) – आभास

Pronunciation: fan·ta·zm
Meaning: something existing in perception only
Synonyms: illusion, apparition, fancy, dream, fantasy
Antonyms: actuality, certainty, fact
Usage: The boy thought he saw a figure in the dark room, but when he turned on the light, he realized it was a phantasm.

51. INDOLENCE (noun) - आलस

Pronunciation: in·duh·luhns
Meaning: lack of activity
Synonyms: idleness, laziness, procrastination, disinclination, inactivity
Antonyms: energy, diligence, industry
Usage: My failure is probably due to my own <u>indolence</u>.

52. ARROGANCE (noun) - दम्भ

Pronunciation: a·ruh·gns
Meaning: exaggerated self-opinion
Synonyms: haughtiness, conceit, hubris, egotism, pomposity, swagger, boasting
Antonyms: humility, modesty, shyness
Usage: Her <u>arrogance</u> repels many people.

53. IMPIETY (noun) - नास्तिकता

Pronunciation: im·pai·uh·tee
Meaning: lack of piety or reverence
Synonyms: blasphemy, heresy, irreverence, profanity, godlessness
Antonyms: reverence
Usage: With an air of <u>impiety</u>, the woman scoffed at the religious texts which she considered fiction.

54. MAVERICK (noun) – अपरंपरागत, विद्रोही

Pronunciation: ma·vuh·ruhk
Meaning: tending to choose a different path from everyone else
Synonyms: individualist, nonconformist, radical, extremist, trendsetter
Antonyms: conformist, conservative, moderate
Usage: The maverick boy made his fortune by using a selling strategy different from that of his competitors.



55. INDEFATIGABLE (adjective) - अथक

Pronunciation: in·duh·fa·tuh·guh·bl
Meaning: persisting tirelessly
Synonyms: tireless, untiring, unwearied, unflagging, energetic, dynamic
Antonyms: idle, feeble, tired
Usage: The director of the homeless shelter is an <u>indefatigable</u> woman who works almost eighteen hours every day.

56. ABJURE (verb) – त्यागना

Pronunciation: ab·juor
Meaning: solemnly renounce
Synonyms: renounce, relinquish, reject, forgo, forswear, disavow, abandon
Antonyms: allow, indulge, emphasize
Usage: Although the chocolate cake is Martha's favorite dessert, she has chosen to <u>abjure</u> it while on her diet

57. ADORN (verb) - सँवारना

Pronunciation: uh dawn
Meaning: make more beautiful or attractive
Synonyms: embellish, decorate, furnish, ornament, enhance, beautify, grace, garnish
Antonyms: disfigure, deform, tarnish
Usage: Several of Gemma's paintings <u>adorn</u> the walls.

58. AMALGAMATE (verb) - मिश्रित करनाना

Pronunciation: uh·mal·guh·meit
Meaning: to join or combine
Synonyms: blend, alloy, ally, coalesce, combine, fuse, mingle
Antonyms: divide, part, separate
Usage: Because of budget cuts, the two schools were forced to <u>amalgamate</u> into one building.

59. INQUISITIVE (adjective) - जिज्ञासु

Pronunciation: uhng·kwi·zuh·tuhv
Meaning: eager for knowledge
Synonyms: curious, intrigued, interested, agog, intrusive, investigative, questioning
Antonym: unconcerned, uninterested, incurious
Usage: The inquisitive little boy would not stop asking his parents questions.

60. WIT (noun) – हाज़िरजवाबी



Pronunciation: wit
Meaning: a verbal skill that can evoke laughter
Synonyms: humor, repartee, badinage, banter, wordplay, raillery, pun
Antonyms: seriousness, stupidity, sadness
Usage: His sharp wit had them all smiling.

61. THUNDEROUS (adjective) - गरजनदार

Pronunciation: thuhn·duh·ruhsMeaning: extremely loudSynonyms: deafening, loud, roaring, shout, thunderingAntonyms: quiet, silent, soothingUsage: They greeted him with <u>thunderous</u> applause.

62. PALE (adjective) – फीका

Pronunciation: peilMeaning: light in color or shadeSynonyms: blanched, dull, faded, bleached, dim, faint, feebleAntonyms: bright, colored, darkUsage: She has a pale complexion.

63. GIGANTIC (adjective) - भीमकाय

Pronunciation: jai·gan·tuhk Meaning: huge or enormous Synonyms: huge, enormous, vast, giant, massive, humongous, mountainous Antonyms: dwarf, little, miniscule Usage: That building is gigantic.

64. SPRAWL (verb) - पसर जाना

Pronunciation: sprawl
Meaning: sit or lie with one's limbs spread out
Synonyms: drape, ramble, recline, spread, slouch, straggle, extend
Antonyms: straighten, compress, stand
Usage: He would take two aspirin and <u>sprawl</u> out on his bed.

65. AVID (adjective) - उत्स्क

Pronunciation: a · vuhd **Meaning:** having or showing a keen interest in or enthusiasm for something **Synonyms:** keen, eager, enthusiastic, ardent, passionate, fervent **Antonyms**: apathetic, indifferent, disinterested



Usage: He took an <u>avid</u> interest in the project.

66. BREATHTAKING (adjective) - विस्मयकारी

Pronunciation: breth.tei.kuhng

Meaning: astonishing or awe-inspiring

Synonyms: spectacular, magnificent, wonderful, awesome, astonishing, amazing, stunning **Antonyms:** unimpressive, boring, disgusting

Usage: The view from the top of the Eiffel Tower is breathtaking.

67. VERACITY (noun) – सच्चाई

Pronunciation: vuh·ra·suh·tee
Meaning: conformity to facts
Synonyms: truthfulness, truth, accuracy, correctness, realism, authenticity, faithfulness
Antonyms: delusion, falsity, inaccuracy
Usage: They questioned the <u>veracity</u> of her story.

68. REFRAIN (verb) - रोकना

Pronunciation: ruh frein
Meaning: stop oneself from doing something
Synonyms: abstain, stop, avoid, withhold, forbear, resist, restrain
Antonyms: continue, encourage, allow
Usage: Taylor will lose weight if she can refrain from eating junk food.

69. SACK (verb) - बर्खास्त करना

Pronunciation: sak
Meaning: dismiss from employment
Synonyms: dismiss, expel, fire, terminate, discharge
Antonyms: hire, appoint, employ
Usage: The minister was <u>sacked</u> for abusing power for his personal gain.

70. CONSPICUOUS (adjective) – सुस्पष्ट, सहजदृश्य

Pronunciation: kuhn·spi·kyoo·uhs
Meaning: clearly visible
Synonyms: noticeable, observable, discernible, perceptible, clear, detectable, prominent
Antonyms: hidden, unnoticeable, indistinct
Usage: The notice must be displayed in a <u>conspicuous</u> place



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
